We are honored to be celebrating this milestone with the young people, community members, and partners who made it possible. Check out the year-in-review document and summary linked below to celebrate our journey together!



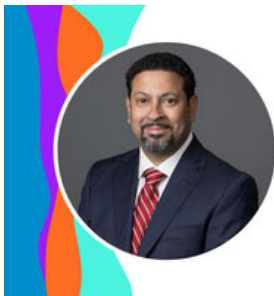
- 2,000+** Youth reached in Diversion, Development, & Credible Messenger Mentorship programs.
- 200+** Community, County, & Philanthropic partners engaged in collaborative planning & feedback.
- 40+** Organizations receiving an initial allocation of approximately \$22,000,000 to advance youth development services & shared learning.
- 38** New team members with a diverse range of professional & lived experiences.

We are also moving into the next phase of planning for our initial Youth Development Networks and I am pleased to share that, this June and July, DYD held three community listening sessions in the Antelope Valley, East LA, and South LA. These sessions fostered collaboration and shared visioning with young people, parents and caregivers, community-based organizations, and County partners. Over 170 community members attended the listening sessions and provided feedback on the development of Youth Development Networks and DYD policy priorities.

Thank you to Sanctuary of Hope (Antelope Valley), Legacy LA (East Los Angeles), and Community Coalition (South Los Angeles) for hosting these listening sessions with us! We look forward to many more opportunities to engage with you in the coming months as we bring Youth Development Networks to life together.

In September, we plan to open funding opportunities for our Youth Diversion and My Brother & Sister's Keeper programs. We will share more information about those opportunities here and on our website.
